Q1) When was the world's first speeding ticket issued?

- a) 1956
- b) 1875
- c) 1896

It's C, <u>1896</u>. Issued in Kent, to a speedster named Walter Arnold (though it wasn't a paper ticket - the first one of those was issued in 1904, in Ohio). For a bonus point, how fast was he going? (answer: 8mph – four times the speed limit!)

Q2) What is the legal minimum tread depth for car tyres in the UK?

- a) 1.5mm
- b) 1.6mm
- c) 2.7mm

UK law requires car tyres to have a minimum tread depth of $\underline{\textbf{1.6mm}}$ in a continuous band around the central three quarters of the tyre.

Q3) Stott Hall Farm is infamous for being a farmhouse situated in the middle of which motorway?

- a) M62
- b) M1
- a) M6

Stott Hall Farm is sandwiched by the <u>M62</u> motorway. Planners had to build around it when the Yorkshire landowner refused to move!

Q4) Brass doorknobs have antibacterial properties. True or false?

It's <u>true</u>. Copper-based metals such as brass are antimicrobial. They have an inherent ability to kill a range of harmful microbes relatively rapidly (often within two hours or less). This is an example of the Oligodynamic effect.

Q5) How many parts does the average car have?

- a) Around 30,000
- b) Around 3,000
- c) Around 8,000

The average car is made up of <u>around 30,000</u> parts. That's down to every last screw and bolt ...we won't name them all though. That's a whole other quiz...!

- Q6) What is an "inglenook"?
 - a) Decorative features around the front door
 - b) The cupboard under the stairs
 - c) A space by a large open fireplace, built so you can sit close to the fire

The answer is C, <u>a space by a large open fireplace</u>. The word comes from "ingle" which meant "fireplace" in Old English, and "nook" meaning a corner or recess.

- Q7) What is the most common colour car in the UK?
 - a) Red
 - b) Grey
 - c) Blue

<u>Grey</u> has remained the UK's favourite car colour since 2018, according to the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders.

- Q8) The mains electricity voltage in the UK used to be 240V. What is it now?
 - a) 230V
 - b) 220V
 - c) 120V

The voltage used throughout the UK is now <u>230V</u>. This was changed in 2003 to harmonise with the rest of Europe.

- Q9) According to the Guinness Book of World Records, what is the length of the longest car in the world?
 - a) 8.7m
 - b) 97.2m
 - c) 30.5m

The limousine dubbed as the 'American Dream' is 30.5m long! It has held onto the title of the world's longest car since 1986.

- Q10) Most household sinks in the UK come with double taps, as opposed to other countries. Why is this the case?
 - a) It's better for the environment by conserving energy and not wasting water.
 - b) It prevents cross-contamination with water from the hot tank which may not be entirely safe.
 - c) It encourages people to develop stamina against the hot or cold.

The answer is B - the separate taps <u>prevent cross-contamination with the hot tank</u>. Most British houses constructed after WWII have a cold-water storage tank, which feeds into a separate hotwater tank.
